Gault&Millau Weinguide awards winery Physiokrat with two "grapes"

All vintages of the Cuvée Physiokrat rated with "very good" until "excellent"

The winery Physiokrat, based in the wine-region Baden, received two "grapes" as an award, when it participated for the first time in the recently published Gault&Millau Weinguide Germany 2018.

In the annually appearing Gault&Millau Weinguide, a standard literature concerning german wines, the best producers get awarded with "grapes", and their wines are rated according to the worldwide common 100-points-system. For the 2018 edition, the team of top-class-experts reviewed more than 11.000 wines and over 1.000 wineries.

All vintages of the cuvée Physiokrat have received scores from "very good" to "excellent", which in the case of "excellent", according to the wine guide's rating system, means: "Impressive wine with great complexity and depth, pronounced typicity and very good ripening potential."

The name Physiokrat is based on the Physiocracy, a doctrine from the Enlightenmentepoch. This includes the thesis, that ground is the only source of value.

The Physiokrat is a cuvée based on Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Cabernet Franc and Syrah, which thrive outstandingly on the Dietlinger vineyards and ripen 12 until 24 months in mostly new barrique-barrels, made of european oak. With this, owner Uwe Blumhofer creates a wine that, according to his philosophy, "combines the high french art of winemaking with the meticulousness and strict quality standards of a german product". The unique concept, with the production of only one wine, culminates in an exclusive marketing to the german high-class-gastronomie.

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
